Using Data to Support our Work

First 5 Orange County uses population-level data to support its work, including:

- Early Development Index

What is the Strong Start Index?

- First 5 Association of California and Children's Data Network launched the Strong Start Index
- Using existing data, the Index summarizes the conditions into which children are born
 - **Updated regularly**
 - **Based on 12 indicators**

12 Strong Start Indicators

Health

- Legal parentage established at birth
- Born to non-teen parents
- Born to parents with at least a high school diploma

Family

- Healthy birthweight
- Absence of congenital anomalies, abnormalities, or complications at birth
- Absence of transmissible (mother-to-child) infections

Service

- Access to and receipt of timely prenatal care
- Receipt of nutritional services (WIC) if eligible
- Hospital with high percentage of births with timely prenatal care

Financial

- Ability to afford and access healthcare
- Born to a parent with a college degree
- Born to parents with employment history



What is the Early Development Index (EDI)?

- Population level assessment of children's readiness for kindergarten
- Teacher completed checklist conducted in second half of school year
- Data available at different geographies (cities, neighborhoods, etc)
- EDI has value and potential to support your work!

- Physical independence




Percentage of Kindergarteners Vulnerable on Social-Emotional Composite
















Anxious and fearful behaviour




Aggressive behaviour

Percentage of Kindergarteners Vulnerable on Social-Emotional Composite




Prosocial and helping behaviour




Anxious and fearful behaviour



Aggressive behaviour




Hyperactive and inattentive behavior

Service Dosage

**4-7 months
1-3 hours per week per site**



Start Well Outcomes

- *Programs are less likely to remove a child from their program due to challenging behaviors*
- *Increase in confidence of **teachers** to support children with challenging behaviors*
- *Increase in pro-social behaviors for **children***



Why Infant/Early Childhood Mental Health is CRITICAL

- 90% of brain development occurs during the first three years of life
- Early life experiences set the course for a child's future social, academic, economic, physical and mental health outcomes
- IECMHC helps prevent suspension and expulsion through:
 - Promotion of social and emotional skills
 - Prevention of challenging behaviors
 - Early Intervention for those experiencing ongoing challenging behavior



Social and Emotional Skills in Orange County

Early Development Index Data

Social and Emotional Skills

% of kindergarten students who are at risk

County-Wide Average

2018: 9% = 2,201 children

2019: 9.6% = 3,852 children

2021: 9.6% = 2,270 children



WHAT IS THE SCHOOL READINESS PROGRAM?

- **A 3 month program that will go to the family's home at NO COST**
- **Assists parents/guardians with any concerns they may have about their child's social-emotional well being, development or behavior**
- **A program that assesses children and their families that are at risk of emotional, behavioral and/or mental health issues**
- **Connect families to community services and a source of education and support for parents**


WHAT DOES THE SCHOOL READINESS PROGRAM DO?



- Serve families and children ages 0-8 who live in Orange County
- Teach parents how to utilize Positive Parenting techniques using evidenced based curriculum Triple P
- Conduct Community Trainings to educate the community about early childhood development

School Readiness Impact in the Community

- School Readiness outreaches to all of Orange County using the EDI map to target the areas that show a higher percentage of children who are not developmentally on track when they enter Kindergarten.
- School Readiness collaborates with school districts and other community providers to provide Community trainings, developmental screenings and attend school events to provide the community information about our program.

Prevention & Intervention

Orange County Parent Wellness Program



Orange County Parent Wellness Program

OCPWP is an early intervention program for at-risk and stressed families with children under the age of 18.

Including:

- pregnant women and their partners who are affected by the current pregnancy or have a child within the last 12 months,
- a parent/caregiver who is experiencing behavioral health symptoms that may be negatively impacting their child's readiness for school,
- families that have current or a history of Social Services involvement

All parents/caregivers enrolled in services are asked to complete the ASQ-SE or ECBI screeners for the child (0-8 years) they are most concerned about to determine if additional referrals are needed.

Orange County Parent Wellness Program

Lessons learned this past year:

- Shifting the provision of services to telehealth and telephone in response to the COVID-19 pandemic have directly impacted level of participant engagement for some participants. OCPWP clinicians are offering in person services to re-engage participants in treatment.

Trends in parenting themes:

- Increase in parents' anxiety about their children's behavioral issues (i.e., increased physical/verbal aggression toward family members/parents/siblings; lack of consistent routines; more negative acting out behaviors; school suspensions; throwing tantrums; toileting issues; etc.).
- Multiple stressors (basic needs, difficulty finding employment due to undocumented status, housing, financial, parenting challenges, relational issues, etc.).
- Parents needing to fill multiple roles (i.e., as a parent, primary provider for the family, teacher due to previous school closures and schools transitioning to distance learning).

For services call 714-567-5192

Eligibility:

- ✓ A mild to moderate behavioral health condition
- ✓ Must reside in Orange County
- ✓ For at-risk and stressed parents/caregivers with children under the age of 18

The Triple P – Positive Parenting Program is a world-renowned, effective, evidence-based parenting education program. It can help develop and support positive relationships between parents and children, improve parent confidence and competence, and make family life easier and more enjoyable. Parents can enroll in either the child (0-12 years) program or teen (12-16 years) program. Parents can request additional support with the curriculum and a trained OCHCA Parent Liaison will respond within 24-48 business hours.
