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Skip the Resolutions!

This year don't make New Year's resolutions.
They're much too hard to keep! This year
make small changes towards a healthier you.
Here are 5 immunization-related steps you can
take to start 2015 off right



- 1. Get your flu shot if you haven't gotten it yet. The CDC says that about half the country is experiencing high flu activity. Everyone 6 months and older is recommended to get an annual influenza vaccination. What are you waiting for?
- 2. Talk to your provider about cervical cancer prevention, including HPV vaccine. January is Cervical Cancer Awareness Month. HPV vaccine is a safe and effective way to prevent many types of cancer. HPV vaccine is a 3-dose vaccine series recommended for girls and boys starting at age 11-12 years.
- 3. Check your kids' shot records. Make sure their info is up-to-date. Better, make sure their info is in the immunization registry! As you know, California's measles cases are making national headlines. And pertussis (whooping cough) is still wide-spread.
- 4. Check the grownups' records, too! Shots aren't just for little kids. And life's no fun when you are-or your spouse is-sick.
- 5. And last but not least, don't forget to wash your hands! Washing your hands is one of the best ways to prevent illness.

Successful school-based vaccination clinics

The Orange County Department of Education, in

partnership with Kaiser Permanente and the Orange County Health Care Agency, is pleased to have completed the School-Located Flu Vaccine Clinics for the 2014-15 flu season. Six Orange County school districts participated in this innovative program; Savanna, Anaheim City, Garden Grove, Magnolia, Buena Park and Santa Ana. The clinics began on 10/29/14 and the last one took place on 12/12/14. In total, there were sixty-two elementary schools that held clinics, and a total of 5, 160 students received flu vaccines. Participation rates varied greatly between school sites, ranging from 4 to 35%.

These vaccines were administered free of charge to any interested student; Kaiser supplied

the vaccine for their members and the OCHCA provided flu vaccine for those students not eligible for vaccines under the Vaccine for Children (VFC) program and/or insured by another health carrier other than Kaiser Permanente.

Kaiser provided the necessary supplies and promotional materials, and nursing students affiliated with Kaiser Permanente administered the vaccines providing a no-cost support and gaining community health experience as part of their community health rotation. The school district nurses were instrumental in organizing the clinic at each site; obtaining clinic dates, parent permission and finding space on crowded campuses in which to hold the clinics.

Since school-aged children are the most important vector for community transmission of influenza, increasing the number of vaccinated children in Orange County elementary schools creates herd immunity in a vulnerable population, and helps to close health disparity gaps in our communities. The school districts benefit by having decreased school absenteeism, and less transmission of flu to their teachers and other staff.

Next steps are to review what practices worked well this year, and to develop strategies to increase participation by schools and students for next year.

CMS now covering the 2 doses of pneumococcal vaccines for those 65yo and older, as recommended by ACIP

Recently, there has been trouble on the pharmacy front regarding the billing procedures of the Prevnar13 vaccine in addition to Pneumovax23 in those over 65 years of age. The Centers for Medicare and Medicaid Services (CMS) did not immediately adopt the new guidelines for Prevnar13 suggested by the



Center for Disease Control's Advisory Committee on Immunization Practices (ACIP).

This resulted in Medicare patients not being able complete the suggested vaccine schedules due to CMS restrictions. Fortunately, CMS has recently released their decision to cover a second dose of pneumococcal vaccine under Part B starting February 2015, if the dose is of a different formulation than the first and given at least a year later. Pharmacists are key stakeholders for improving pneumococcal immunization rates and this decision aligns with the ACIP recommendations.

Health practitioners are encouraged to refer their patients to their neighborhood pharmacies to receive their pneumococcal vaccines. Remember, the most successful method to decrease community-acquired pneumonia rates involve informing patients on the need to obtain two separate pneumococcal vaccines once they reach 65 years of age.
