

# Prevention and Intervention Planning Process Report on TAY, Veterans, LGBTIQ Focused Programs September 11, 2018

#### **Introduction**

The Prevention and Intervention services planning group for Transitional Age Youth (TAY) including 16-25 year olds, veterans and LGBTQ programs met on September 11, 2018. The group discussed the following overarching ideas and identified four community needs. The following tables summarize the ideas discussed for consideration for each identified community need, the potential gaps and identified possible action steps. The table also lists the known services being provided by the County and in the community at large, though it does not provide details of the services or their ability to meet the current need.

#### **Overarching Ideas**:

- Technology-based interventions/education for students and their parents
- A comprehensive Resource Inventory is needed
- Peer support model for TAY, LGBTQ communities and Veterans
- Interagency partnerships
- Persisting stigma
