Prop 36 Program Implementation

- Prop 36 passed by California voters in November 2024, allowing individuals who possess illegal drugs to be charged with a "treatment-mandated felony," instead of a misdemeanor, in some cases.
- OC's Collaborative Courts brought Health Care Agency (HCA), District Attorney and Public Defender together late in 2024 to plan for implementation
- HCA staff began Prop 36 evaluations on December 27, 2024, utilizing existing staff

Prop 36 Program Implementation continued

- Prop 36 Evaluations are conducted centrally in Santa Ana and in custody by BHS staff
- Court progress reviews are being completed at the four branch courts, during Prop 36 court sessions
- Opioid Settlement dollars are funding two Prop 36 clinicians

Prop 36 Program Census Update

- 609 prospective participants referred
- > 355 agreeing to be evaluated for Prop 36
 - 64% unhoused
 - 79% Medi-Cal members
- > 167 agreeing and accepted into program
- 12 individuals exited from program
- > 155 currently in the program

Next Steps and Questions

- In process of hiring second clinician for Prop 36

Opioid Settlement Plan Timeline

- November 2022 OC received the first payment of opioid settlement funds
- ➤ January 2023 HCA created a detailed plan that leveraged existing prevention, treatment and recovery systems already in place
- October 2023 HCA launched the Fentanyl is Forever Campaign in OC, using opioid funds

Opioid Settlement Plan Timeline continued

- ➤ Early 2024 HCA reached out to cities that contributed some of their funding to provide a menu of supports
- ➤ November 2024 HCA held an Opioid Response for Cities Forum to share County's Plan, align efforts and network
- ➤ December 2024 HCA began braiding funding into adult SUD residential master contracts, increasing bed capacity

Six High Impact Abatement Priorities

- Fund-Matching for substance use disorders (SUD) facilities
- 2. New or expanded SUD treatment infrastructure
- 3. Communities of color and vulnerable populations
- 4. Diversion of people with SUD from justice system
- 5. Vulnerable youth drug addiction prevention
- 6. Naloxone distribution and expansion

Addressing the Needs of Criminal Justice-Involved Persons

- ➤ Provide Medications for Opioid Use Disorders (MOUD) to individuals who are incarcerated
- Fund recovery residential stays for individuals with Opioid Use Disorder (OUD) upon transition to the community
- ➤ Braided funding to support Intensive Outpatient Treatment in custody setting
- Fund two staff positions for Proposition 36

Addressing the Needs of Pregnant or Parenting Women and Their Families

Funding for two coordinators (Alcohol & Drug Counselors) for linking mothers with substance use disorders to treatment services and supports

Preventing Misuse of Opioids & Overdose

Fentanyl is Forever Muli-media Campaign and website

- ➤ Opioid facts, dangers of illicit fentanyl, locations for Naloxone, and local resources for treatment and recovery services
- ➤ Public Service Announcements from various perspectives

Expand the Friday Night Live Programing

➤ Youth opioid misuse and/or overdose prevention efforts

Preventing Overdose Deaths by Implementing Harm Reduction strategies

- Naloxone education, training, and distribution
- Overdose Prevention Kit distribution
 - Naloxone (Narcan or Kloxxado) and fentanyl test strips
- Medication disposal using Deterra Pouches



Plan Strategies 5 and 6

5. Expanding SUD Treatment Services

- ➤ Braid Funding into existing master contracts for adult residential treatment services, including withdrawal management
- ➤ Braid funding for sobering center services

6. Expanding SUD Recovery Supports

➤ Braid funding into existing Recovery Residences master contract
